The museum's goal is to collect, preserve, interpret and display the history and heritage of the naval presence on Canada's West Coast and of the military on Southern Vancouver Island.



## 30 years and going strong

This year marks the 30th anniversary of CFB Esquimalt Naval and Military museum.

On Saturday 04 July, the museum is celebrating with an Open House in the Museum Square at Naden, 10 a.m.-5 p.m.

The all-day event will feature an encampment and presentations by the Victoria-Esquimalt Military Re-enactors Association, special exhibits and displays from the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) Association, the British Columbia Aviation Museum, The Alberni Project HMCS ALBERNI museum and memorial, and a range of other groups and organizations. and fun activities for children and adults, the official opening of a new museum gallery, and cake.

In setting up this event, we feel very fortunate to have the assistance of Christine Farrington, Special Events Coordinator for Canadian Forces Morale and Welfare Services (CFMWS) Personnel Support Programs Division.

Admission is free, and we invite members of the public and friends of the museum to come "sea us" and help us celebrate this significant milestone for CFB Esquimalt Naval and Military Museum.

## The collection begins

The museum at Canadian Forces Base Esquimalt had its official opening on May 5 1985, to coincide with the 75th Anniversary of the Navy.

But the museum was still very much in need of artifacts in order to create meaningful exhibits. The work of assembling such a collection continued, and the museum, then located in Building 20 at Naden, finally opened to the public in 1987, later expanding into Naden Buildings 37 and 39, where it can be found today.

## Web redesign through Q College Partnership

Welcome to CFB Esquimalt's redesigned website. It features new content, new resources for researchers, and a brand new look and feel. The site is now thoroughly accessible for laptops, smart phones and tablets, as well as personal computers - a major step forward in sharing our museum and archives with a wider online community.

#### New projects include -

- online access to Navy List publications;
- a comprehensive list of ship's company and group photos available for sale;
- an expanded, searchable database of names and christening dates engraved on our ship's bells;
- digitized, detailed versions of ship plans from the museum collection for purchase by model builders.

The website was totally revamped in

a cooperative project with Q College in Victoria. Having read about, and seen the results his students achieved for organizations in need of a website overhaul and update, I first contacted Denis Eve, the College's Practical Skills Web Development Program Work Experience Director, in July 2013. With experience of working as the Museum's webmaster for more than a decade, I was very conscious that our site's design could use a thorough shake-up, and was also keen to expand its reach and range of online projects. Normally, comprehensive redesigns of this nature are very costly, into many thousands or even tens of thousands of dollars. And so we jumped at the chance to get such significant outside help and expertise at no cost.

Q College allowed us to have free access to the valuable web development talents of graduate student Joseph

Kotopski. Kotopski based his theme for the site on an original layout by designer Alan Graves for our "Creature Comforts" mascot display, and we think you'll agree that the result is elegant as well as functional.

It took many months of behind the scenes work to follow-up on Kotopski's initial design, adapt existing content and add in new projects, ideas and articles. I received training in the Drupal content management system to administer and implement the revised site, and have been fortunate enough to have the ongoing guidance and help of Web Developer Stephanie Mann.

We hope you will visit the improved site regularly and return to find updates and added resources. Screen shots can be seen in the advertisement to the left.

## Navy insignia in print

Museum Volunteer Dave Freeman is about to visit a printer to produce his second book, titled Designs of Distinction, Unofficial Insignia of the RCN, 1910 - 1948.

Official RCN ship badges were first introduced in November 1948, and Dave documents all the interesting, varied and colourful predecessors of the current badges. His work is the result of 15 years of research, which has taken him across Canada on many occasions to visit museums, archives and Legions and interview naval veterans about their memories of how the unofficial badges were designed and displayed. This will be a companion volume to his first book, Canadian Warship Names, which came out in 2000.

Designs of Distinction is to be printed in full colour on 8.5 X 11 inch acid free paper, 624 pages, soft cover, bound and containing roughly 1,000 images.


The first eight chapters cover the introduction of insignia into the navy, the different types of such insignia, some background in heraldry and how it influenced some designs, the early days up to 1939, the war years, funnel markings for various escort groups, and some downstream effects seen on present day ships. Then, each ship, establishment or unit gets half a page illustrating their image, plus a plain English description of that image, date produced, name of designer and producer, and notes on the provenance of the insignia.

Dave Freeman's book also contains several interesting Appendices, three Indexes, and a Bibliography.

This book will be of interest to both current and retired naval personnel as well as model makers and descendants of those who served in particular ships, establishments or units.

The book will retail for \$50.00 and copies should be available in some time early in April 2015.

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## Local authors utilize museum archives

One of the main reasons researchers come to our archives is to find photographs to illustrate articles and books. If you look at the Spring 2015 issue of *British Columbia History*, you will find an article by Gisele Samson describing the career of Vice-Admiral Victor G. Brodeur. She used one of our photos in the article to highlight a sign, with Victor Brodeur's name on it, which hung above the entrance to the French language school, when it was located in what is now our Museum Administration Building.

Professor David Zimmerman of the University of Victoria also recently requested photos from us for use in his upcoming book, Maritime Command Pacific: The Royal Canadian Navy's West Coast Fleet in the Early Cold War, which is to be published by UBC Press in 2015. Professor Zimmerman kindly provided

me with the following synopsis of his book.

"Yacht Club" was a derogatory term used by Royal Canadian Navy sailors on the Atlantic coast to refer to the illusionary easy life enjoyed by their Pacific coast counterparts. In reality, during the Cold War the Maritime Command Pacific's warships were every bit as active as their counterparts in the Atlantic. For the first time the history of the defence of Canada's west coast in the early Cold War is told.

The book begins in 1945, exploring the painful postwar downsizing, including the work stoppages that rocked the service to its very roots. The gradual rebuilding of the postwar navy and its rapid expansion as the Cold War heated up after the Korean War is told in detail. A major theme is the evolution of planning for the defence of the west coast, including the

development of the joint US-Canadian ALCANUS accord. MARPAC's ships engaged in extensive training exercises, often working as integral components of the United States Navy's Pacific Fleet. Always in the background was the threat to North American security posed by the increasingly powerful submarines of the Soviet Navy. Included is first account of MARPAC's experience the Cuban Missile Crisis. The book concludes with the rapid downsizing of the RCN which by 1965 once again left Canada without an effective naval presence in the Pacific.

We take great pride in being able to assist local authors with their research. It is our hope that the public will be spurred on by reading these publications to visit our museum and perhaps do some research of their own.

## **BOOK REVIEW**

While there are many published accounts of the naval war in the Pacific, there are very few about the operations of the British Pacific Fleet, and even fewer with any Canadian content. I stumbled on this book in a local bookstore and picked it up not because of the title - there are others with a similar moniker - but the cover photograph was one taken by a Canadian aboard HMCS UGANDA. It depicted the final moments of a diving Kamikaze aircraft just before it struck the British carrier HMS Formidable. In the background is the battleship HMS King George V, aboard which was the author of this book. An instant sale!

Waite Brooks joined the RCN from Sault Ste. Marie in the Fall of 1942. No sooner had he signed up than he was whisked off to the newly opened Royal Roads university in Victoria. This book is his story through Royal Roads and

onto operational training with the Royal Navy, initially serving aboard cruisers and thence onto battleships. The author used his notes taken during his training and fleet assignments as the basis for his observations, so his memory of dates, details and events should be reliable. The book is presented in chronological sequence, so does not jump around as some historical tomes tend to do. It is most interesting to see how the events of the world were interpreted by those on the scene at the time of occurrence. This is particularly true of the news of the atomic bombs, as those on the front lines tried to understand the scope of these new weapons. Also of interest was the reaction in the British fleet when UGANDA left the theatre of operations when it was determined she "voted" herself out of the war. A fascinating read.
