M'GOWAN, GEDDES, M'MACKON STAR AS FLYERS WIN 36-34

In a game that had the spectators standing at the finish, Peregrine's up and coming Mens Senior Basketball team lost a close one to RCAF at Dartmouth 36-34 last Thursday night. It was a tough one to lose.

Starting fast, the Flyers ran in four quick baskets without reply in a display of very hot shooting. "Crusher" McGowan finally broke in the clear and scored to put Peregrine on the board. After a time-out the Peregrine quintet hit their stride, working the ball around smoothly. Baskets by McGowan, Bell and "Red" Martin evened the score at 12 all. Air Force again forged into the lead and the teams left the floor for the half time breather with Peregrine on the short end 21-16.

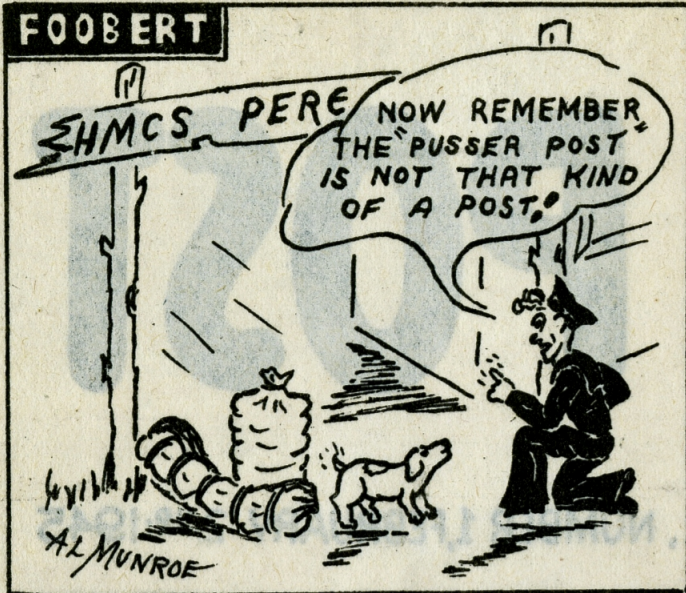
On resumption the Flyers again controlled the play with Wieselberg sinking two neat efforts from the keyhole. After six minutes of play "Bobo" Bobowski counted for Peregrine to bring the score to 26-18 for Air Force. The Flyers boosted the score to 34-21 with 10 minutes to go, when Peregrine finally began to bear down. McGowan sank a nifty from the corner, then another from close in and the heat was on. Geddes found his shooting eye and popped in two sitters to make it 34-28. Poulton put Air Force further ahead to 36-28 with only minutes to go. But Peregrine came back strong with McGowan and Geddes again finding the hoop to make it 36-32. Bell going in at great speed missed a sitter. Geddes also narrowly missing on a fine shot with only 20 seconds left. But "Wacky" McMakon sank a beauty to make it 36-34 in the dying moments. Air Force finally gained possession and stalled the remaining few seconds to win a real thriller.

Coach Red Martin's proteges controlled a good deal of the play and had their shooting been on, the result would have been different. Smarting under this defeat, Peregrine is out for blood tonight when they meet HMCS King's here in the Drill Hall. If you want to see some bang-up basketball turn out tonight and support your team. Game time is 8 p.m.

PEREGRINE CORNWALLIS HOOP SERIES WOWS CAGE FANS

On the evening of Saturday, January 13th Lieutenant "Jake" Edwards brought his powerful Cornwallis basketball team to Halifax for the express purpose of meeting our Peregrine club in the first two games of a scheduled home and home series.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Following the first blast of referee Johnny Altman's whistle, the Cornwallis sailors quickly settled down to a systematic zone defence that definitely spelled trouble with a capitol "T" for Peregrine's team, under the guidance of Sports Officer Lieutenant Stevens.

Undaunted by this preliminary display of defensive power our hustling gang of hoopsters went to work with a vengeance when the smoke of battle had cleared temporarily away at half-time, the score read as follows:

Peregrine 23, Cornwallis 16.

It wasn't so much because "Crusher" McGowan and "Red" Martin scored 17 points between them in this half and "Wacky" McMakon scored every rebound off the Peregrine backboard, that we enjoyed this comfortable lead, but more because every player on the team worked like a trojan against what seemed like impossible odds.

This fighting spirit and determination continued throughout the second half. Peregrine added another cool 23 points and Cornwallis whipped in 26 to make the final score 46-42 in our favour.

It was unquestionably the best played game of the year and swell Saturday night entertainment for sport minded ratings and Wrens stationed at Peregrine.

SECOND GAME - A CORNWALLIS VICTORY 57-37

Whether it was overconfidence, overwork, or just plain overwhelming Cornwallis power in the final 20 minutes of the Sunday afternoon tilt, is a matter of opinion, but the bare facts show that Peregrine was outscored 33-13 during this session following up a tight 24-24 score at the interval.

Naturally enough Lt. Edwards was happy when his proteges came through with such a whirlwind finish to even up the series.

Refreshments were served early Sunday evening to the visiting players at a reception in the Wrens Fo'c'sle and it was certainly a restful and fitting climax to a pair of hard fought games.

ON TO CORNWALLIS

The following week-end January 20th and 21st we entrained for HMCS CORNWALLIS to continue the exhibition series against the experts from the Annapolis Valley.

Just what happened in the two return games at Cornwallis is already history, but for the records, Peregrine went down to defeat 48-37 and 48-45.

We had the honor and pleasure of playing the first official games on the new basketball court in the classy P&RT building. Nothing has been spared to make playing conditions comparable to the best in the country and we willingly compliment those who were responsible for carrying out the general layout details.

The hugh gallery was jammed with ratings for both games and we feel certain that they were not disappointed in the cage exhibitions turned in by the rival Navy teams.

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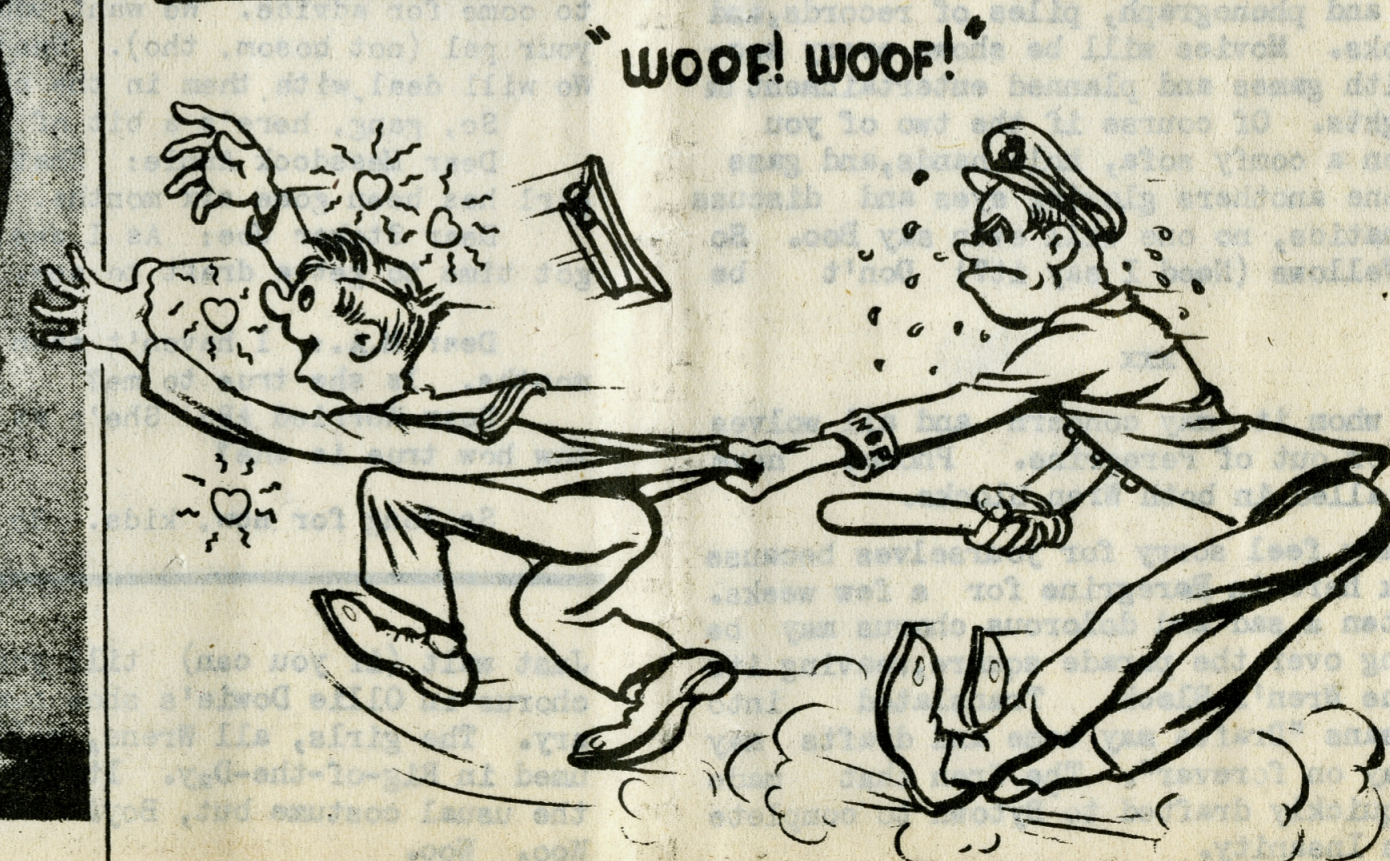

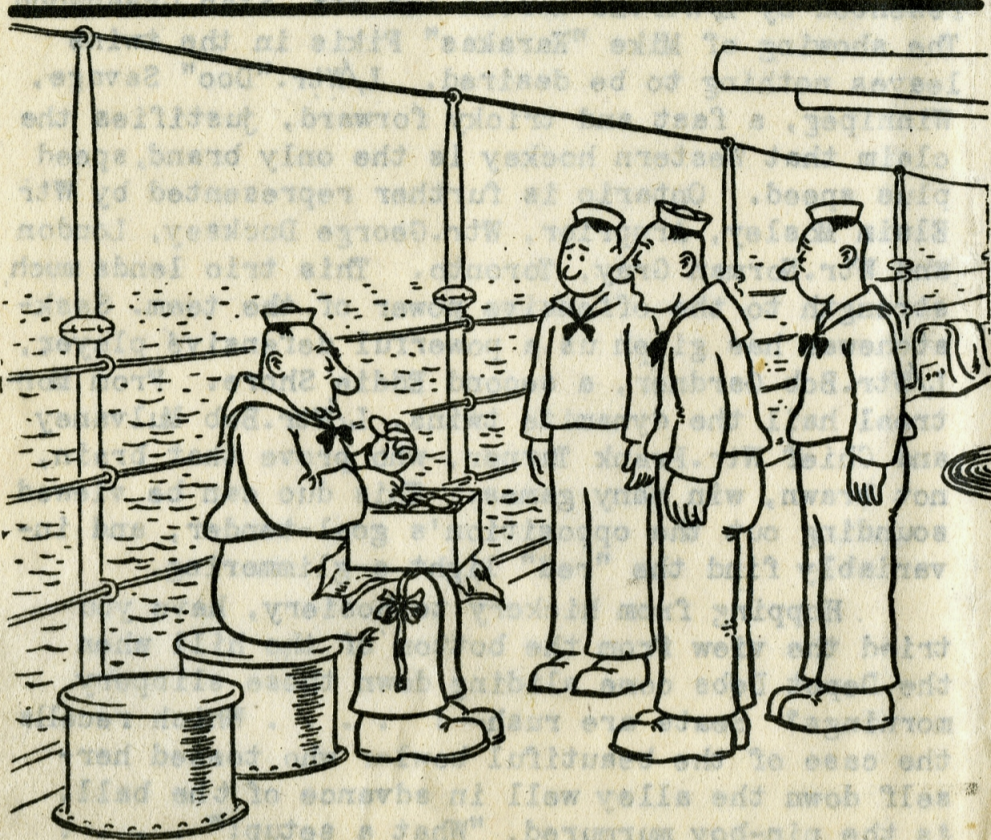
